Ongoing Volunteer needs:

Meal Driver Volunteers for older adults who are no longer able to cook or shop for themselves and need a Wednesday driver and a Thursday driver. Volunteers can be reimbursed for gas mileage. Most people drive one day a week – arriving around 10:45 and finishing in about 2 hours. Some people share a route driving one to three times a month. Many working volunteers deliver meals during their lunch break. Would like to expand to include Fridays, but ONLY if they get enough kitchen and driver volunteers. Kitchen volunteers help to prepare, pack and serve lunch items. This shift lasts from 9:30am to 12:30pm.

Home delivery lunch drivers begin at 10:45 and are finished within two hours.
