



Realities for Non-Citizen Families

- Current stressors on non-citizen communities exacerbate 1) the minimizing of domestic violence and 2) isolation for LEP survivors.
- Over 25% of the U.S. foreign-born population is in California. ~220 languages are spoken here, with ~40% of Californians speaking a language other than English at home.
- Language and cultural access to services and systems for survivors of domestic violence and human trafficking is illegally limited.

About Gum Moon

Gum Moon addresses the unmet needs of API immigrant women and children – especially those who are survivors of domestic violence (DV), sexual assault, and human trafficking.

We foster stability, self-reliance, self-determination, and full access to opportunity.

Core Programs / Offerings

- Transitional Housing with bilingual supportive services
- Parenting Education and Support Groups
- Parent-Child Interactive Groups
- Drop-In Playgroups and Grandparents Support Groups
- Summer School, Weekend Children Art and Piano Classes



Current / Key Issue

- Focus on immigrant survivors and their families is particularly needed because they lack family support and are isolated and stigmatized by the abuse.
- Immigration reforms creating fear and toxic stress with immigrants. Immigrants fear using government programs will harm their immigration status.

Key Stats

- 19% API women reported having been pressured to have sex without their consent by an intimate partner since age 18, and of these, 44% were raped.
- 12% reported that an intimate partner had hurt or had attempted to hurt them by means of hitting, kicking, slapping, shoving, object throwing, or threatening their lives with weapons.
- Reports indicate decline in application for public benefits i.e. Medicard, WIC, CalFresh and SNAP

How We Address These Issues




- Outreach efforts with CalFresh (Food stamp)
- Legal Services Collaborative attorney available to answer questions regarding public benefits and immigration issues.
- Assistance with US citizenship applications
- Bi-weekly support groups for DV clients

About Narika

- To promote the empowerment of women in the South Asian community and other underserved populations.
- To confront and overcome the cycles of domestic violence and exploitation.
- To build a movement to end violence against women.
- To actively support women's rights as human rights.

Current / Key Issue

- 64% of Indian and Pakistani women have experienced abuse by an intimate partner.
- In 7/10 South Asian households there is some form of control, coercion or abuse.
- Culturally specific challenges:
 - Importance of honor (e.g. honor killings)
 - Role of extended families (especially in-la
 - Arranged marriage and child marriage
 - Female feticide
 - Social stigma against divorce

Narika Clients

- 85% of Narika clients have children
- 90% Narika clients are born outside of U.S.
- 75% of Narika clients don't have a job
- Common Nature of Abuse in South Asian Communities
 - Non-physical Coercive Control Tactics
 - Financial/ Communication/ Movement Control
 - Immigrant Status/ Immigration Hurdles
 - Rigid Gender Roles/ Family Values
 - Children used as pawns
